Director's Note

Welcome to the first Yakima County Department of Human Services Newsletter! I hope that this publication will give you a look into the work we here at the Human Services Department do to serve the residents of Yakima County every day.

The last couple of months have been full of new contracts, new grants, and new ideas about how to continue providing services in the age of COVID-19. In addition to awarding our 2020-2022 round of Homeless Housing and Assistance Program Grants, this year the Human Services department has: Developed a strong public-private partnership with the Yakima Valley Community Foundation to provide resources through the Yakima Valley Nonprofit Needs website and to start the Yakima Valley Broadband Action Team; worked with the Veterans Coalition and Health District to redesign the annual Stand Down event to serve veterans safely during COVID; partnered with the Yakima County Development Association to distribute financial assistance to small businesses impacted by COVID; began a project to install solar panels on tiny homes at the Yakama Nation Village of Hope shelter to create COVID isolation units; and secured \$2.88 million dollars in rental assistance funds to keep our neighbors in their homes during this difficult time.



If you're reading this newsletter, it's because you are someone who is interested in the well-being of our community. I hope this newsletter answers some questions you had about Human Services Yakima County – and maybe even raises some new ones. 

COVID has made it more clear than ever that **access to reliable and adequate internet is a necessity, not a luxury**. Many people in our valley have NO access to the internet or it may be slow and unreliable. Without internet, families can't access education for their children, connect to doctors, apply for work or financial assistance, or maintain important social connections while isolated. The internet is essential to our community's health, education and quality of life.



Right now, community partners in the **Yakima Valley Broadband Action Team** are working together to collect data about internet speed and availability throughout our region. The data will be used to request funding from federal, state and philanthropic sources to help improve the broadband infrastructure and put essential technology in the hands of communities and families to allow all residents equal access to education, health and other vital resources.



Rental Assistance

The Department of Human Services, in partnership with the Washington State Department of Commerce, has secured an additional **\$2.88 million dollars of rental assistance** to assist families in need this fall.

Our most recent (pre-COVID) figures show that at least 43% of renters in Yakima County are cost-burdened or severely cost-burdened when it comes to housing – meaning that more than 30 or even 50 percent of their income goes towards housing costs. With the governor's moratorium on evictions still in place, we haven't yet seen the full impact that COVID could have on our community. Given how many households were already one or two paychecks away from eviction before COVID, it's clear our community will benefit from supporting the families and individuals struggling to figure out how they will be able to afford rent and arrears once the moratorium is lifted.



We aren't going to wait until the evictions hit – **we need to act now**. This additional rental assistance will keep families in their homes, prevent mom-and-pop landlords from defaulting on their mortgages, and suppress a sudden rise in homelessness in our community.

Yakima County Human Services is partnering with the following agencies to provide rental assistance paid directly to landlords for residents of Yakima County:

Schools Reopening and Online Safety

As our schools reopen in the fall, many students in our County will be attending classes 100% online. While online classes will be keeping families safe from COVID, students spending more time online may present an increased risk of new dangers: **online bullying, identity theft, and even human trafficking.**



Help keep your students safe online this year with resources from NetSmartz (missingkids.org/NetSmartz), NetSmartzKids (netsmartzkids.org), Common Sense Media (commonsensemedia.org), and Internet Safety 101 (internetsafety101.org).

Key strategies for parents include:

- Create a list of “internet rules” with your kids
- Set parental controls and using filtering and monitoring tools as a compliment – not a replacement – for parental supervision
- Supervise all internet-enabled devices and keeping computers in a public area of the home
- Check the history file on the computer your child uses
- Teach children not to interact with people they don’t know
- And most importantly – communicate with your children! **Be a trusted adult** who they can come to with concerns. Be prepared to have conversations about healthy sexuality, when to share information even with friends, and how to tell what kinds of websites are safe to use.

Good luck to all our students and families in this new school year! You might be a Davis Pirate, a Grandview Greyhound, or a member of the Wapato Wolf Pack – wherever you are learning, we are proud of all of our county’s students, and hope you have a great year!
